### Message from the Co-Directors

This year we have built on our housing and homelessness research, our work on poverty and quality of life, indicators, and metrics, including Social Return on Investment (SROI), as well as on grant applications, including SSHRC funding, and community-driven research on a sexual violence action plan.

COVID-19 has frustrated some efforts, including the 2020 PIT Homelessness Count, while underlining the inequities that interdisciplinary, intersectoral, & intercultural research might address.

We have continued to contribute to national efforts by Universities Canada, Community Campus Engage Canada, and others to foster institutional change and strengthen community capacity, infrastructure, and the impact of community-campus partnerships.

It has been a busy year on our successful housing affordability SSHRC-CMHC Partnership Development grant building partner relationships, co-designing the research, and collaborating on a full five-year Partnership grant application (People, Places, Policies, and Prospects: Affordable Rental Housing for Those in Greatest Need) with Cape Breton U, Carleton U, and others (Quebec, BC, States) with a budget of \$1,308 million, in-kind U of S support of \$270, 880 and a generous in-kind contribution of \$366,000 from community partners.

We again had change on the Management Board, thanking Sylvia Waterer and Nicholas Fraser for their terms, while welcoming Roy Lavallee, Social Development Consultant, City of Saskatoon; Athanas Njeru, Local Immigration Partnership (LIP) Coordinator, Saskatoon; and Kayla DeMong, Associate Director, AIDS Saskatoon (now Prairie Harm Reduction).

We also welcomed one new research associate, Dr. Charles Plante of the Graduate School of Public Policy, who is already leading one CUISR study.

This was the last year of the generous funding of the Saskatoon Food Council by Mosaic in support of research and collaboration on a sustainable, accessible food system that can support community food security. Our sincere thanks to Mosaic.







  - In what ways different programs may result in **distinct shelter** (affordability, security, quality) and non-shelter (safety, health and well-being, social capital, access to amenities and employment) outcomes?
