Remembering Joe Garcea



It is with heavy hearts that we mark the passing of Dr. Joe Garcea, a long-time CUISR Management Board member, researcher, and passionate believer in community-university research. Joe Garcea was a brilliant scholar, award-winning teacher (recognized by Arts and Science, Provost, and Master Teacher awards), generous mentor, and one of those rare human beings whose heart and generosity of spirit proved inspirational. Joe was as modest as he was gracious and generous and was loved and admired by all who came to know him.

Joe's commitment to his students was legendary; his commitment to collegial processes was matched by his community engaged scholarship. Even in his final days, he co-authored with a graduate student a book chapter on the 2020 Saskatchewan election, assessing party diversity profiles and issues.

Joe always had time for the media and public education. So highly regarded were Joe's expertise and commentary that he was a regular on the networks who relied on his fairness and ability to bring to life topics from civic governance and local to federal politics; immigration, integration, and interculturalism to public policy, Indigenous-municipal relations, and so much more. He was winner of both the U of S Award for Distinction in Outreach and Public Service and the James Pooler Award for contributions to regional and urban planning.

Joe's was truly a life well lived. He has enhanced all our lives here in Saskatchewan and well beyond. We will miss him greatly.





15-minute telephone survey (n= 1.750)


