Message from the Co-Directors

We started the year by celebrating the YWCA Women of Distinction awards of two of our board members: Colleen Christopherson-Cote and Patti Tait. Such richly deserved awards for two remarkable leaders!

This year we participated as a proponent of Communities and Sustainability that was formally added to the Signature Areas in February 2022, while building on partnership relationships (welcoming Saskatoon Tribal Council Cress Housing, Local Immigration Partnership, and Saskatchewan Landlord Association) on our SSHRC-CMHC Partnership Grant on **People, Places, Policies and Prospects: Affordable Rental Housing for Those in Greatest Need.**

While continuing our roles (Buhler and Findlay) on the Research Acceleration and Strategic Initiatives' Pathways to Equity research group, we helped host a workshop on Housing Insecurity, Renter Equity, and Homelessness in October 2021. We also contributed to the new OVPR SSRHC Partnership Development pilot. serving on

the adjudication committee to foster greater success.

We continued to build on sexual violence research with SASS and FSIN on a sexual violence education initiative, while finding significant demand for our Social Return on Investment (SROI) expertise, adding studies for the Children's Aid Society of Toronto and the College of Nursing to our national study of Basic Income. We also found ourselves preparing for the 2022 Point-in-Time Homelessness Count in six weeks rather than the typical four to five months to meet the federal deadline of April 30, 2022, for the completion of counts.

While board membership remained unchanged this year, we were delighted to welcome as a research associate Professor Carol Henry of the College of Pharmacy and Nutrition.



- **Funding:** Saskatoon Housing Initiatives Partnership (SHIP) on behalf of the Government of Canada's Reaching Home: Canada's Homelessness Strategy
- Study objectives:
 - Develop a multi-faceted picture to fill data gaps and put a human face on statistics
 - Complete an indoor and outdoor survey to count and identify the service needs of people experiencing sheltered, unsheltered, and transitional homelessness (core **populations**) as well as hidden homelessness on a single day (April 28, 2022)
 - Document data from the Homeless Individuals and Families Information System (HIFIS) and administrative data from participating shelters & transitional housing
 - Engage all encountered in a community conversation to identify **Public Perceptions**, a **unique feature** of the Saskatoon counts.
