Message from the Co-Directors

This was a busy year completing a number of projects, continuing others, and working on a new SSHRC-CMHC Partnership application with Co-Principal Investigators Liam O'Brien and Jacqueline Kennelly at Carleton University. The application importantly built on our ongoing SSHRC-CMHC Partnership Grant on **People, Places, Policies and Prospects: Affordable Rental Housing for Those in Greatest Need**—the mid-term review of which we successfully completed. As the fiscal year ended, we were preparing to host a National Working Group meeting here in Saskatoon with public events scheduled for May 3.

In March 2023 we received the good news that our application--**A Safe and Affordable Place to Call Home: A Multidisciplinary Longitudinal Outcomes Analysis of the National Housing Strategy**—was fully funded at \$4.8M over 5 years. We at CUISR will be national leads on the major theme of Health, Social and Economic Outcomes

Message from the Co-Directors (cont'd)

We launched reports (with new community versions): the 2022 Point-in-Time Homelessness Count(August 2022), the fruits of our partnership with SASS and FSIN on a sexual violence education initiative (January and March 2023), Research Junction and Social Return on Investment (SROI) studies, including national ones with the Children's Aid Society of Toronto and Coalition Canada

We were sorry to accept the resignation of Community-Co-Director **Roy Lavallee** whose role at the City was proving increasingly demanding of his time and energies. We are so grateful for his stellar contributions at CUISR and wish him the very best. We are also anticipating another loss to the board with the retirement in June of **Len Usiskin**, a CUISR founding member and tireless advocate.
