This was another busy year completing and implementing strategic planning and taking over Pathways to Equity working group from USask's Research Acceleration and Strategic Initiatives (see separate report), as well as submitting funding applications, adding to Board membership and the research associate cohort, and continuing a high level of research activity, .

On February 26, we hosted a **Community Conversation on Advocating for Housing Rights** at Station 20 West, designed and facilitated by our Lived Expert Advisory Council, showcasing our SSHRC-CMHC-funded research and engaging 90 registrants in small group discussions. Participants gave strong feedback including requests for training for advocacy for housing rights which we have been busy putting together along with an Advocacy Guide and Toolkit.

We have also been working with the Lived Expert Advisory Council and research assistants on presentations, poster, and a roundtable accepted for C2UExpo in Edmonton in early May.



Message from the Co-Directors (cont'd)

In late fall 2024 we submitted to SSHRC-CMHC a three-year renewal application (along with PI Catherine Leviten-Reid at CBU and Jackie Kennelly at Carleton) designed to build on our five-year Partnership grant **People, Places, Policies, Prospects: Affordable Rental Housing for Those in Greatest Need**.

We welcomed to the CUISR Management Board **Iris Akbar**, Support Services Manager and Leadership Team member, OUTSaskatoon, renewing a longstanding relationship. Manor Transition Initiative: Outcomes and Evaluation Year One

What is the study about? Elmwood Residences Inc. and the Ministry of Social Services, Community Delivery are moving you and your friends from Kinsmen Manor to new community. The move is happening because residents often do better and feel happier in smaller community settings. Kinsmen Manor is no longer meeting needs. This study explores how living environments can be improved and how you can be best supported in the move.

What is quality of life (QoL)? QoL means how you feel about your life, your home, your friends, the support you have, and your goals.

What do the researchers do? The researchers talk with you, your families, staff, and others to understand what changes in your life, how and why, and to help you improve your quality of life.

What is quality of life (QoL)? The World Health Organization (WHO) defines QoL as an individual's understanding of the impact of living arrangements on people living with intellectual disabilities (ID). QoL means how you feel about your life, your home, your friends, the support you have, and your goals.

What do the study researchers do? The researchers have conversations with residents, their families, and friends to ensure that the voices of those most affected are heard and that concerns are at the forefront of the study. They ask questions about living at the Manor and how they feel about the move to a new community. The questions in these eight domains used for evaluating QoL: personal well-being, social inclusion, physical well-being, and material well-being. Sometimes, the questions are asked according to a 5-point scale like this:

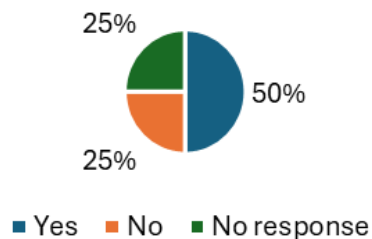

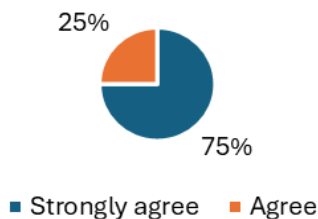


Research Assistants' Feedback

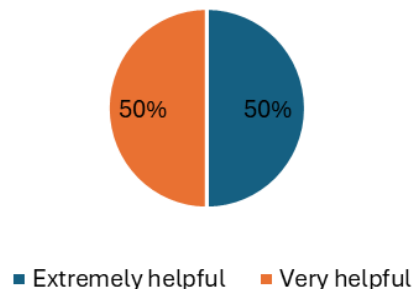
Was the training that you received to develop the research project sufficient to meet your needs?
