



Housing First programs housed:



255 Children

Rapid Rehousing programs housed:



124 Children

SINCE 2014

the Government of Canada has invested

\$7.4 million

to address homelessness in our community.

This funding has gone towards Housing First supports, new housing, facility improvements, and Rapid Rehousing and other Housing Placement services.

During this time, the combined community investment from all levels of government and private donations has been

- Income and transportation were the two top needs identified by those experiencing homelessness.
- 53.6% felt they would be successfully housed with help managing alcohol issues, illustrating the importance of the Managed Alcohol Program.
- 43.3% felt they needed help with disability services to get housing.
